

Another Visit from Mother Nature

While we did not have a confirmed tornado as was seen just south of Claremont on the evening of May 16, 2022, it sure felt like it. As severe thunderstorms rumbled across our area they swept a swarth from Old Sutton Road to Old Blaisdell Road, across the lake to Bass Point and up to the center of Blaisdell Hill. Along the path of the microburst, multiple trees, limbs and power lines were downed. Objects were blown off their footings, appearing to be picked up and deposited haphazardly. A large pine fell directly on a home on Blaisdell Hill Road, fortunately not injuring its occupants who spent the night with their next-door neighbors. A section of Route 114 at Foot Hills Road and down past Old South Sutton Road was shut down to clear debris and restore power lines. While many lake residents experienced significant trees uprooted and fallen, fortunately no major damage was done to homes and camps.

On-Call Weed Watch and Boat Launch Use

BLPA members who wish to use the boat launch should request a pin code to the smart lock if you have not already done so. Non-BLPA boaters who intend to use the launch throughout the summer may join as Seasonal Boat Launch members and receive a unique pin code for the season. Single day users may go online and request a launch time and will be met at the gate by an On-Call Weed Watch volunteer who will inspect the boat and supply a temporary pin code following a successful inspection. Alternately, single day users may text or call the On-Call Weed Watch line to request a launch, but online registration is strongly encouraged.

Weed Watch needs YOU! On-Call hours 8 AM - 4 PM ONLY. Please sign up at our website for a full week or full weekend of on-call duty.

Weed Watch still needs

you! Sign up at our website, same as always. You can now conduct weed watch duty from home, only going to the beach when it's necessary to inspect a boat. Please sign up for a full week or full weekend time slot. On-Call hours are 8 AM - 4 PM ONLY and you will not be the only person on-call. You can go about your day and not be tied to the phone for the entire shift. Because of the low probability that a single day user needs inspection during your shift, its quite likely you will never be called to the lake at all. You'll simply be "on-call."

Without boat launch inspections, we are at significant risk of introducing milfoil to the lake, which - as you know - has already infested several nearby lakes. <u>Every</u> <u>member is encouraged to</u> <u>volunteer for at least one</u> <u>On-Call Weed Watch seg-</u> <u>ment this summer</u>.

Please do your part and sign up for On-Call Weed Watch. For more information, visit the <u>BLPA</u> <u>Weed Watch website</u> page and the <u>BLPA Boat Launch</u> page. When using the boat launch, PLEASE make sure you close and properly lock the gate after you at all times. Fully push up on the shackle to insure the lock is engaged. Do this both after you launch and after you take your boat out of the water. This is the only way we can protect Blaisdell Lake from milfoil infestation that would greatly harm our waters.

Important!

Always shut and LOCK the gate both after launch and upon return to shore. Fully push up on the shackle to lock.

Flashback: Old Man of the Lake

An autograph saying "To one old clown from another," and signed by Emmet Kelly; an autographed picture of Red Skelton, a mechanical parrot; an old shooting gallery that fires pennies; if you hit the bullseye, you get the penny back - these are just a few of the things that make up the world of retired showman Chet Wright, who has owned and operated his little store at Blaisdell Lake Sutton, for 52 years.


"When I came here, there was only seven houses here," the 83-year-old humorist recalls. "I came up here looking for a summer camp and found this little store. I bought it and later added the house." That was back in 1919, and Mr. Wright has lived here ever since.

He got his big start in show business in 1908, when at the age of 20 he joined the **Oregon Indian Medicine** Show. Five years later he formed his own vaudeville troupe and went on the road with a tent show that featured his dog and bird act. His big feature was a little dog who would climb up a 50-foot ladder to a tiny platform, then leap off into space. Landing in a canvas blanket stretched over the ground like a trampoline.

could attract attention," Wright commented. "It had little rungs about a half a foot apart so that the dog could climb it. People would come up to me and say that they didn't believe no dog was going to climb that there ladder and that it was just a gimmick to get people to come to the show. They'd get the surprise of their life when that little dog actually did it. One night, though, after the show, some kids came in and cut the guy wires that held the ladder up. It came down and got smashed all to pieces. I never did that act again."

"Dogs and birds were easy train." Wright went on. "The hardest animal to work with was a goat I used in one of my acts. He was supposed to be hidden under a table and on cue would wald off with it. making it look like the table was moving by itself. Well, one night that goat, Jimmy was his name, he came charging out from under that table and butted me good right in the side. Knocked me right off

the stage!! The audience was laughing real hard, so I just got up and went on like it was part of the show, but my side was aching like crazy. The next day one man came up to me and said that it was the funniest thing he'd ever seen and was I going to do it again that night. Well, I looked at him, my side was still aching, and just said, "No sir, I am not!"

Wright married Miss Ola Gay, who then joined him and sang and played musical instruments in his shows. After they bought the store, they would live there during the summers, and go back on the road during the winter, renting town halls where they could. Finally, in 1945, after 37 years on the road traveling from Maine to Georgia, the Wrights settled down for good in the little store.

Mrs. Wright died in 1958, and since then Mr. Wright has devoted all of this time to his store and his little museum of memorabilia of the world of show business. Among some of the items he has there are an old hand-cranked organ owned by P.T. Barnum back in 1897, and a ventriloquists dummy that is over 100 years old. There is also a collection of old posters, photographs, and movies.

Through the years Wright has managed to keep his wonderful wit and sense of humor. The front door to his store is covered with

In Memoriam

We are sad to share the news of the passing over the winter of two longstanding BLPA members.

Richard P. Manual (1933 – 2022)

Dick Manuel of South Hadley, MA and Stony Pines Cottage on Camp Kemah Road passed away on March 12, 2022. A devoted family man, he was a friend to everyone he met, and quick to lend a helping hand. Above all else, he was always a true gentleman! Dick was born on August 11, 1933 in Washington, D.C. to Theodore and Gladys (Conard) Manuel. He attended Duke University and graduated in 1956 with a Civil Engineering degree. Upon graduation, he fulfilled his ROTC commitment in the U.S. Air Force as a 2nd Lieutenant stationed at Westover Air Force Base. In 1960, he married his beloved wife of 62 years, Joan Glesmann. They settled in South Hadley and raised three children whom he adored: Lynda McClintock (Darby O'Brien) of South Hadley, Judith Harding (David) of Glastonbury, CT, and Richard Manuel, Jr. (Cara Sterling) of Winchester, MA.

Dick worked as an engineer for Aquadro & Cerruti, Inc. in Northampton, MA for 50 years, many of them as their dedicated Treasurer. He oversaw the construction of hundreds of buildings in the Pioneer Valley: schools, office buildings, churches, parking garages and college buildings, most notably laying out Hampshire College.

Throughout the years, Dick served his community in many different leadership roles worthy of his Eagle Scout status: Town Meeting and Prudential Board member, Deacon at First Congregational Church, Boy Scout Leader of Troop 301, President of Evergreen Cemetery, and even as a volunteer firefighter for District 2. He was also President of the Blaisdell Lake Property Owner's Association in New Hampshire.

Dick spent as much time as possible at his family lake house on Blaisdell Lake. It was his "happy place." His engineering acumen and construction skills transformed an old Girl Scout camp into the family's favorite gathering place. This was the location for knot-tying lessons with Grampy, working on puzzles, reading on the dock, competitive tennis and ping-pong tournaments, horseshoe games, fort building in the woods, swimming, sailing, kayaking, waterskiing, and many, many famous Manuel theme parties! Endless happy memories were made at the lake. His family will especially miss having those late-night chats on the porch, listening to the loons.

Dick leaves behind his dear sister Lorraine May and her family of Morro Bay, CA. A brother-in-law Robert A. Glesmann, III of Granby, MA and nephew Robert T. Glesmann (Sheila) and family of Severna Park, MD. He was predeceased by brother-inlaw Jonathan Glesmann and wife Janet, and sister-in-law Jane Glesmann. He also leaves 6 cherished grandchildren who thought the world of their "Grampy": Emily McClintock of Seoul, South Korea, Jake O'Brien of South Hadley, Molly and Matthew Harding of Glastonbury, CT, and Nicholas and Jeffrey Manuel of Winchester, MA.

Joseph L. Cohen (1933 – 2022)

Joseph (Joe) Cohen M.D. of Beverly, MA and Old Blaisdell Road, passed away on January 8, 2022, at the age of 88. Born in Worcester, MA to David B. and Sylvia (Magaziner) Cohen, Joe graduated from Brandeis University and then Tufts University School of Medicine in 1959. Joe leaves behind an enormous legacy both professionally and in his adoring family.

Joe's professional career was spend at the Lemuel Shattuck Hospital where he worked from the early 1960's until he retired after 48 years of service. He was a skilled and compassionate oncologist, medical researcher, and held numerous leadership positions at the Lemuel Shattuck Hospital including serving for 33 years as the Medical Director. Additionally, he served as an Associate Professor of Medicine at Tufts University School of Medicine. He helped launch several groundbreaking programs including Boston Health Care for the Homeless and the first inpatient HIV/AIDS unit in New England at the Lemuel Shattuck Hospital.

Joe's professional life was complemented by a very fulfilling personal life. He enjoyed time with his family, relaxing at his lake house on Old Blaisdell Road, working on various handyman projects, traveling, listening to classical music, cooking and, in earlier days, running, bicycling, sailing, and skiing. More than anything, he adored his wife (Freddy) of 63+ years and was always her partner and best friend. Every family member had a special bond with Joe, from each of his kids, to his siblings, to his grandchildren and greatgrandchildren. Any person who knew Joe was better for it.

He is survived by his devoted wife, Frieda Kala Cohen formerly of Brookline, MA and four sons, Stephen Cohen (Martha) of East Haddam, CT, Mitchell Cohen (Betty) of Foster City, CA, lan Cohen (Jennifer) of Beverly, MA and Colin Cohen (Jennifer) of Annapolis, MD. He is also survived by eight grandchildren as well as 2 great-grandchildren.

Water Testing. Chris Kelley and Steve Domber continue to conduct tests of lake water and have scheduled a visit with the state biologist at the end of July.

Road Salt Concerns. A sub-committee including Jenn McCourt and Steve Domber have been working over the winter along with Sutton Conservation Commission and lake association member Deb Lang to determine if the state will designate the stretch of Rt. 114 from Russell Pond past Wright's Beach as a Low or No Salt zone. The issue is on the agenda for the Sutton Board of Selectmen, as town approval is also needed.

Dam Maintenance. Bruce Ellsworth will petition at this year's annual meeting for member approval to lower the lake level in the fall of 2023 for scheduled five year maintenance at the dam. Prior to lake lowering, Bruce wants input from boat launchers regarding the incline at the end of the ramp to determine if that needs some adjustment while the lake is lowered.

Board Opening. Members are encouraged to contact the Executive Committee if interested in filling a board seat at the end of this season.

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
